The funding allowed GPI to provide transportation to outdoor programs for youth from the Darrington area, Project Girl, Korean Community Service Center, Connect Casino Road, and Kulshan Creek Neighborhood. For all of our partner groups, transportation to the outdoors is a consistent challenge. This allowed for 599 hours of programming 5,000 hours of youth outdoors. Our programs included mountain bike riding, foraging, rafting, canoeing, science collection of environmental DNA to discover local species and restoration.

As a result of your support, Tulalip Cares empowered communities across Snohomish and Skagit to learn and grow in the outdoors. Glacier Peak Institute's humble ability to support our greater community through outdoor education grew. As did the demand from our partner organizations.
