We want to thank you for your generous gift to help us finish our *Native Species* Exhibit. It has been a long journey, but the beautiful new exhibit had its grand opening this past weekend.

The finished exhibit has three habitats—Forest, Seaside, and Camas Prairie. The forest interpretation talks about how the Lower Skagit people here used the Cedar trees for many things and explains their cultural importance to those people. The Camas field has a reproduction Camas roasting pit, and tells how Coast Salish people cultivated Camas and used it for food. The seaside ecosystem talks about how fishing and shellfish were an integral part of the culture.

There are signs showing the common name, scientific name, and Lushootseed name of the individual Flora and Fauna. There are also three smaller that will change periodically to talk about subjects in-depth. Currently, one has Raptors, one has bats, and one has shells of local shellfish.
