NW Children's Foundation (NWCF) deeply appreciates Tulalip Tribe's partnership in our mission and work with your grant of the April 2024. We are pleased to submit this report on your grant's impact and our expenditure.

Q4 2023 14.2 Progress Report

With your support, we continue to meet the challenges of the past few years by sustaining and supporting our region's capacity to build resilience and end the intergenerational cycle of child abuse, neglect, and trauma. Thanks to NWCF's high-touch approach to grantmaking, we have broad and deep relationships in the child welfare arena and are extremely well-placed to direct our grant dollars wisely to effective agencies.

<u>Grantmaking</u>: In listening to our partner agencies, we know the challenges of the past few years. NWCF's work – and the Tulalip Tribe's support – is more important than ever. **In FY24 we distributed \$800,000 to 59 agencies** doing essential work to heal children, strengthen families, and empower youth. These grants provide life-changing services to over 220,000 children annually in our community.

Educational Outreach: Our annual Forum on February 8, 2024, drew over 920 child-welfare stakeholders from 25 states and beyond to learn from experts in childhood trauma. This virtual event, **Child Well-Being and the New Science of Trauma: Regulating the Nervous System to Promote Healing**, featured Dr. Linda Chamberlain. An expert for over two decades in the field of brain development, Dr. Chamberlain shared the latest research and science-supported tools to reset the nervous system. Dr. Chamberlain was joined by presenters from BELONG Partners, Ryther, and the co-directors of the Integrative Cultural Healing Model. They shared the different ways they use mind-body strategies in their work with children and families, covering relevant topics such as fostering connections for a stronger, healthier school community; sensory tools to help children calm the nervous system; and how the Integrative Cultural Healing Model helps tribal communities heal. The response to this event has been incredible, with **98% of respondents stating they would be able to use the knowledge they'd gained in their work right away**.

Thank you for your support over the last year. As NW Children's Foundation prepares to celebrate our 40th Anniversary, we are extremely grateful for partners like Tulalip who have made our work possible.

As NW Children's Foundation enters its 40th year, I find myself reflecting on the remarkable evolution we've experienced both as a community and as an organization. Our progress has been shaped by many dedicated individuals — from the four inspired women who founded NWCF to the countless donors, volunteers, staff, board members, and agency partners who are *making hope work* every day.

The heart of NW Children's Foundation is this vibrant community, united by a shared commitment to building a brighter future for children and families in our region. Within the following grants pages, you will read about the exceptional programs that have made a difference over the past year. While we can't capture every individual success — the child who found his voice after entering preschool too frightened to speak, the family transitioning from a shelter to their own home, or the young teen discovering her own potential and value — each program is making a profound difference for children and families.

NW Children's Foundation has always been a learning organization and is committed to making the latest science and research in the field available to all. This past year's 17th Annual NWCF Forum, *Child Well-Being and the New Science of Trauma*, featured renowned developmental scientist Dr. Linda Chamberlain, who shared her latest insights with a wide audience invested in child and family well-being. The event drew 928 registrants from 280 organizations across the country, and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. An impressive 98% of surveyed participants reported that they could immediately apply what they learned in their work. One attendee captured the experience, saying, "Thank you for this opportunity to pause, listen deeply, learn, reflect, and explore paths to healing both within ourselves and in our connections with others."

I have served twenty-two years with NWCF, and I am still awed each year by what we are able to achieve together. As we enter this milestone anniversary, I am excited about celebrating four decades of impact as well as the possibilities and progress still to come.





Healing Children

These grants help children who have suffered abuse and neglect **heal from their traumatic experiences and find permanency and stability**. We prioritize programs that target long-term benefits that **build resilience** and **halt the intergenerational cycle** of abuse, neglect, and trauma.

Boyer Children's Clinic: Therapeutic intervention to support foster parents in building nurturing relationships with young children who have special healthcare needs.

Child Advocacy Center of Snohomish County at Dawson Place: Coordinated medical, mental health, advocacy, protection, and law-enforcement services for children in Snohomish County who have suffered abuse.

Childhaven: Trauma care and treatment services to strengthen families and support the healing of children ages birth to five who have experienced trauma.

Children's Therapy Center: Services for special needs children provided by trained social workers, occupational therapists, family resources coordinators, and speech therapists.

Community Action Council: Coordinated, multidisciplinary response to children who have experienced abuse and their families including prevention, investigation, prosecution, and treatment.

Encompass: Fully-equipped mobile lab to facilitate therapy programs for children and families in rural areas, homeless shelters, transitional housing, and schools.

Family Law CASA: Advocacy for children in high-risk custody cases.

HopeSparks Family Services: Family support, education, and specialized counseling for children who have suffered trauma.

Kindering: Services to promote the social and emotional well-being of children involved in the child welfare system and living in out-of-home placements.

King County Sexual Assault Resource Center: Parent education and therapy to help non-offending caregivers respond to their child who has been sexually abused and improve safety for their children.



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Agency Partner Spotlight

Vine Maple Place

Every day in King County, up to 1,700 children face homelessness. With locations in Maple Valley and Kent, Vine Maple Place is dedicated to ending this crisis. Since 2000, they have provided single parents and their children with the resources and tools needed to become safe and stable and leave homelessness behind forever.

Rolande was a single parent living with her four kids in a cold storage unit with no electricity, for months. The stress of their situation was overwhelming, causing her children to fall behind in school and leaving Rolande determined to find a safe place for her family to call home.

When Rolande reached out to Vine Maple Place, she and her children were immediately provided with emergency housing. Staff at Vine Maple Place supported Rolande in her job search and in finding permanent housing. Meanwhile, her children participated in the Family Hope Center's program, where a team of tutors and counselors created a custom development plan based on each child's unique needs. This program focuses on healing, building coping skills, strengthening interpersonal relationships, and nurturing a positive sense of self.

Thanks to this comprehensive support, Rolande secured a job that allowed her to provide for her family, and they moved into a stable, permanent home. Her children have caught up in school and continue to benefit from the children's program at Vine Maple Place.

Rolande and her family are among many who have found support when they needed it most. NW Children's Foundation is proud to partner
